The Sundays of April, 2019: Join us on April 7 for Benevolence Sunday, on April 14 for Palm Sunday, on April 21 for Easter Sunday and on April 28 for Jazz Sunday.

Luke 4.18 "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, 19 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Over the years I have led workshops on church growth. Before I would get into the mechanics of being a welcoming church I always began by asking, "Why do you want to grow?" In almost every case the answer was something like, "We need more people so we can fill our committees and meet our budget." I would then have to deliver the bad news. I would have to tell them that no one was going to join their church to work on their committees or give them money.

Simon Sinek in a speech to a business conference says that "People don't buy what you do, they buy why you do it." He goes on to say, "What you do simply serves as the proof of what you believe."* It is my experience that people join a church because they are moved by the congregation's "why." They catch the excitement and want to be a part of what is going on.

Peter Senge says, "In the presence of greatness, pettiness disappears. In the absence of a great dream, pettiness prevails." A congregation that is clear about its "why" usually doesn't get bogged down by the small stuff. But when they forget their "why" that is when "pettiness prevails".

Jesus entered the synagogue at the beginning of his ministry and made his "why" perfectly clear. "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor proclaim release to the captives - recovery of sight to the blind - to let the oppressed go free - to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." His ministry and life were rooted in this vision. And from that day in the synagogue to this day people have joined him because of his "why".

"We are an inclusive community of faith, courageously following Christ, serving our neighbors in love." Sound familiar? It should because it is South Church's mission statement. It is our "why". And let me tell you that I experience it as an exciting vision. I know there are people in the community who want to be a part of a church that is pursuing such a vision. I hope over the next few months we can continue to hold that "why" up and make it the focus of all our work together. I also hope we can get the news out that a church with such a powerful vision is in their community.
