From the Moderator

Why are we doing this?

As South Church, we have many practices and programs. We have habits and ways of doing things. About some of these programs and practices we have clarity about why we do them and how, and others we do just because well *that's how we've always done it*.

Rev. Lindsey is our Designated Term Minister. Her contract with us centers around this core commitment:

"During this designated time, our congregation will commit to actively work with you (Rev. Lindsey) as we mutually and faithfully discern the viability, mission and future of South Congregational Church."

Mutually and faithfully discerning the viability, mission and future of South - that's the charge.

"I know South has had several outside consultants come and work with you to discern your future; in recent memory there is Beverly Prestwood-Taylor and prior to that was the New Beginnings program. No doubt increased self and congregational understanding and some energy for some people emerged out of these experiences. At the same time, I have a sense that things haven't really stuck, that the changes, for example, *committed to* in the New Beginnings vision didn't hold up. There are lots of reasons for this. One dynamic though, is the gap between what we might want to be and what we actually are. Unless the vision of what we decide we *want* to be is fully supported with personnel, resources and a story that celebrates it, it will flounder without the significant energy needed to start and sustain something new." - *Rev. Lindsey*

Instead of starting with a brainstorming session imagining a future of South, imagining all the things we *could* do and be, **these** curiosity-led conversations are about starting where we are, listening in for where the energy is (and is not), and emerging what our motivating why/s actually is/are.

We can then let that energy and emerged clarity lead us in **mutually and faithfully discerning the viability, mission and future** of South Congregational Church.



"We could come up with a vision of something really different from what we are currently doing like convert the bulk of the building to affordable housing, for example - but it will be more likely to succeed if the new vision emerges from some values and practices already present, already actively motivating South. We could say, for example, we learned through engaging in curiosity-led conversations that providing material and spiritual sanctuary to people in need is energizing for South Church members, and that we have a long and current history of doing this. So, building on this core motivating mission, we are going to focus our energy on partnering with organizations working on housing in Springfield, and figure out how to offer our building for affordable quality housing in the neighborhood. See how that vision emerges from a sense of already present energy and leans into the future?" - Rev. Lindsey

What exactly are curiosity-led conversations?

Well, to start with, they are a "practice". And as such, take intention, learning and sometimes, reminding each other how to have them.

They are conversations around programs and practices of South that start from the premise of seeking the stories in each thing. In curiosity-led conversation, we approach each topic with curiosity instead of criticism; with appreciation instead of judgement; and with an interest in learning and sharing the stories inside and behind them.

We listen wondering: What do you learn about South? Any themes show up? Where was there energy?

In our last Leadership meeting we had a fun and engaging conversation around the South Church Cook's program. I, personally, had no idea how important the faith and energy of Caroline Murphy was in ensuring the success of South Church Cooks. Clearly her legacy continues on in how we continue to serve our neighbors.

Can folks who are not on Leadership get involved?

Absolutely! If you are interested in participating in one or more of these conversations, talk with me (Kim).

What we do ask of folks not already on Leadership is that you come into the space with the same commitment Leadership has made: to be curious, not critical; appreciative, not judgmental; and to seek to learn and share the stories inside and behind the programs and practices of South.
