From the Pastor

Covid 2021

We are in a new phase of our lives and our life together with Covid. South, you have been so good about getting vaccinated. You have worn your masks without complaint. You continue to hold patience around eating together and singing hymns together. I feel so grateful for our shared understanding that we do this for the well-being of all; that we make these accommodations so that we can protect one another. As a church community, we have stayed remarkably healthy through this very challenging time. My intention is to continue to make decisions that sustain and protect the health of our community.

Unfortunately, Covid has not gone away. And, as you know, positive cases of Covid are indeed spreading in Springfield and nationwide. Back in March 2020, we made a quick, hard but also somewhat easy decision to go completely remote in our worship and church life. We did that so well, South! Thank you.

September 2021 feels quite different and the decisions about how we gather are more layered. For the time being, we will continue to gather for in-person worship Sundays at 10

a.m. in the Parish Hall, while also streaming through Facebook and YouTube. The Zoom worship room will be opened also, but in a pared-back form, primarily for folks calling in and wanting to listen to the service. As of this writing (August 31), in Hampden County the rate of Covid cases is 36 per 100,000 residents. While this rate is significantly lower than in those areas of the county experiencing surges, it is still the highest case rate in the state, and is quickly increasing.

With the return to school this week, we can anticipate an increase in the coming days and weeks. The science is showing multiple things:

- The vaccines are still very effective at stopping severe cases of Covid and hospitalization. So, getting more folks in the community vaccinated is a priority.
- Masks are an effective additional protection, along with the vaccine, against severe Covid.



• Vaccinated people are still able to spread Covid.



All to say, I intend to keep the worshipping community of South as safe as possible, following the science and making decisions for safety. Thank you for your adaptability, your patience, and your commitment to the health and well-being of this community.

Director of Music



It looks as though a cage has been built to keep the organist from getting away, doesn't it? Well, it's actually scaffolding that was assembled on the chancel and in each balcony in order to replace the fire sensors way up in the ceiling. The equipment has been installed and the scaffolding is gone now. Meanwhile, the organ has had its annual tuning and maintenance and it is ready to liven up our hymn singing, as soon as it is safe to sing hymns again.

It strikes me that I haven't talked about the South Church organ, or organs, I should say, in a while, so here's a little background. The pipes of the current instrument, which was installed in 1970-71 by Austin Organs of Hartford, lie in three stories of chambers behind the pipes you see in this picture. The pipes you see no longer play, but are what remain from the original organ installed by Hook and Hastings in 1875. The keyboard, or console of that first organ, sat in an alcove behind the current choir pews and the wind would have been produced by actual human beings pumping a bellows in the room behind the chancel. An electric motor was installed

during one of several overhauls of that instrument that happened in the 1890s and 1909. Then in 1925, a brand new organ replaced the first one. It was built by the Skinner Organ Company of Boston and it boasted four keyboards plus pedal and many orchestral sounds.

By doing a little math, you can deduce that each organ lasted 45 to 50 years, and the current Austin organ turned 50 this year. That by no means indicates that it is time to get a new instrument, in fact, this one is in pretty good shape for its age. While a major re-leathering project will be necessary at some point in the future, it should serve us well for some time to come. Meanwhile, the small organ in the chapel is also an Austin product, built around 1989, I believe. It is identified as a "unit" organ, which means one set, or rank of pipes can be used for multiple stops, or sounds.

The red organ in the back of the sanctuary has been with us for some time now, but it actually belongs to Grant Moss, who some of you will remember was a frequent substitute for past organists here at South. He rescued it from being junked by Amherst College, and, recognizing that it was a valuable instrument, asked if we could give it a foster home while he looked for a buyer. That was some years ago, and meanwhile there is a glut on the market for used organs with so many churches closing their doors, so it may be with us for some time to come. It was built by the Berkshire Organ Company and is "self-contained," meaning that the blower, the pipes, the keyboard, the pedal board, and all of the actions are contained in the unit you see. By comparison, looking at the big organ in front, the blower is in the church basement, the wind chest is in a room behind the chancel, and the pipes are in three separate chambers on two levels above that.

I just happened to look at the monthly newsletter that was published in September of 1971, fifty years ago. There was a little paragraph that announced that the "new" Austin organ would not be completely installed when services resumed on September 12. What a coincidence that, fifty years later, we are delaying our start of services in the sanctuary that would have happened on the very same date. One day, hopefully soon, we will hear the South Church instruments again. The future is so hazy, thanks to variants, but hang in there! As the article said, it will have been well worth the wait! - *Larry*

ACTS is beginning their 36th year of providing free after school tutoring services to Springfield's elementary school children. As we attempt to recover from the pandemic and deal with the variant,




ACTS is planning to re-open our free after-school tutoring sites beginning in late September. We will be following all the safety protocols as required by the Springfield Public Schools and health officials.
