Introducing the South Church Viability Working Group

What is the South Church Viability Working Group?

A small group committed to asking questions that clarify South's viability and engaging the congregation in honestly answering them.

The Viability Working Group is the group committed to helping South be intentional about our present and future. The Viability Working Group will *not* be coming up with a plan and then saying *this is what we have decided to do.* Rather, the group is committed to creating and engaging you all in a process of honest discernment toward clarity around South's future.

What is "viability"?

Part of what the Working Group will do is clarify the definition of viability for South.

Some of what viability might include is:

- People capacity capable, engaged folks to tend both the business and the missions of the church? Some of this capacity is related to the age of the congregants and how busy their lives are beyond church and skill sets.
- Financial capacity a sustainable income stream? Clarity on financial priorities?
- How do we have a sense of ourselves connected to the cultural shifts around us that we are all a part of whether we want to be or not?
- What is within us.

Why is it?

Uncertainty. We do not like uncertainty. And yet, we live with uncertainty all the time. And uncertainty around South's future is present, too.

South has a dwindling membership, worship attendance and church engagement. This is a trend that has been going on for years. South is not alone among churches in that. While we have the financial resources to just keep on keeping on for some time, our faith and our love of South challenges us to engage our present and future with intention. When we make decisions with intention, clarity and energy emerges.

We want South to live with intention, using whatever form we may need to evolve to take.

Rev. Lindsey's term as our Designated Term Minister is from October 2020 - October 2025. A little more than a year prior to the end of her term, South and she will discern together if this is a ministerial relationship that we both want to continue and turn into a "settled" pastorate.

We need to be honest in our discernment over the next 2 to 3 years in part so that we have clarity when the time for a ministerial transition comes.

We also hope that by taking on the complicated question of South's viability and wrangling with it with love and intention, the Viability Working Group can help open some channels of relief and trust within the South Church community.

How will it work?

Unlike "church growth" consultants South has hired in the past, the Viability Working Group is composed of people who are part of South. This is not a one weekend event. Rather, over the course of a year and more, the Working Group will map out ways of engaging with South, with the Leadership Circle and the whole congregation, so we can together express and understand where we are.

We don't yet know exactly how we will work! This is also part of the uncertainty. But we are committed to working with you all on this. This will not be a case of the Working Group coming up with a plan and then saying *this is what we have decided to do.* Rather, this is a process of wandering together and in that wandering, with intention and by honestly engaging questions and making observations, to come together in clarity around South's viability.

Who are the Viability Working Group members?

Polly Southworth



I have been a member at South my whole life.

There was an 11-year period when I was in college and grad school and my first job where I lived around the Finger Lakes of New York state. But I returned to Massachusetts and my roots when I was 29. I got married, had a kid and returned to church.

Why? The simple answer is I wanted my child to have a religious foundation. I didn't think too deeply about it at the time. It just seemed like "what you did". I like comfort and familiarity and South offered that. It's true you can't pick your family, but you can pick your church. I didn't really pick South since I was "born" there, but over the years, it's come to me that the circles you put yourself in after your family are very special and South has come to fall into that category. The solace, spirituality, people and community I find at South helps me in my life.

If South were to cease, I'd probably find another church. But, of course, it wouldn't be the same.

I never involved myself with the New Beginnings effort because it didn't feel right. How could they come in, tell us what to do, and leave?

As Lindsey has said, we have uncertainty and anxiety over the future. It's time to jump in and look at us from the inside. Us talking to us. Not someone else talking to us. It seems we need to be proactive and deal with the issue now. So maybe it's too late for South, but I don't think so or I wouldn't want to get involved.

It is not easy to try to look "clearly" at yourself or an organization, but if South is important to me, I need to try to keep it going so that the church can be important to someone else. Involving all of us in

this discussion is important because we are South. The answers are not clear now, but with prayer, laughter, and commitment, I think we can find them.

I've been part of three efforts aimed at discerning "Where does South Church Go from Here?" They ranged from unguided self-examinations to efforts guided by the UCC Conference or consultants. I was Moderator during some of them and very involved in the day-to-day life of South. Unfortunately, as Pastor Lindsey points out, our past efforts haven't really brought about much.

I was very involved in the New Beginnings project. Forty South members spent many weeks in meetings and discussion about our past, present and future. It

guided us to confront what kind of congregation we are and to what kind of future we aspire. Are we a Country Club where we pay our dues and sit back waiting to be served? Or, are we an activist congregation which gets out of the pews and the building to deeply connect with and serve our community? Or something in between? We picked the latter, a congregation dedicated to our community, ready to understand its hopes and to serve in love. But there was no implementation plan and day-to-day issues undermined the good intentions. As the Moderator at that time, I regret the lost opportunity.

This one is different for me. I'm no longer as involved, spending half of the year in Florida where I belong to another UCC church. Although I continue to "attend" many South Services via Zoom, the distance gives me a new, more detached perspective of South and of its future. My affection and hopes for South are undiminished but now they are balanced with uncertainty of our future. My detached view allows me to face that if it were not for the endowment, we would not be at 45 Maple Street, would not have a full-time minister or music director or staff.

Which prompts the question – what, besides the endowment, could possibly hold us together as a vibrant faith community "courageously following Christ"? The answer lies somewhere within you and the congregation.


The Benevolence Team will be meeting on Sunday, Nov. 14 at 11:15.


