



From the Pastor

Dear South,

On Sunday, January 30, South's Viability Working Group led the reflection in worship. Here is <u>the link</u> to the recording of that worship service.

As they described, "we are aiming to talk about viability, sustainability and where (physically and spiritually) we imagine South being in the next few years **so that we can ultimately have a plan and action steps.** We are doing this with you because we will need to make decisions together and choose to act together."

One way into the planning and acting is engaging in *informed wonder*.

Specifically, as South, as members and part of the wider community of South, informed wonder means reflecting on these questions:

What do we Know? about South, about the context of ministry, about the nature of church, about the pushes and pulls of today that impact our viability and sustainability, about the capacities and incapacities of South...

What do we Trust? What really guides us.

What do we Fear? about change, about where we are and where we might be in a few years, about where we want to be or don't want to be...

therefore

What do we Wonder about? How is what we trust leading us?

What do *you* know, trust, fear and wonder about as you reflect on the viability and sustainability of South?

Director of Music

A church member recently asked me a question about our choir. While stating that he was very happy with the high-caliber musical offerings he hears from our paid, professional singers, he wondered if it were not possible to get more volunteers involved in the group. I have been asked about this fairly often in the past and my answer has usually been "yes...but..." Then I have a short list of reasons why it is more difficult in our situation to attract and keep volunteer singers. Consider the following:

- Because we have paid up to eight professional musicians to provide sung offerings for us each Sunday, the pace at which we rehearse is pretty fast. Time is money, as they say, and our professionals are expected to have a good handle on the part they have to sing. Putting all the parts together has often been a race against time on Sunday morning, and the poor volunteer who sings but has not had as much musical training as the professionals can get left behind. I will say that our paid singers have been very supportive of the volunteers over the years and have tried their best to help them along, but the volunteers often drift away discouraged.
- One of the aspects we value the most here at South is our diversity, and that can also present a challenge when asking individuals from very different musical and cultural backgrounds to fit in to an ensemble based on a European and American mainstream church concept of sacred music. Someone who was raised in a black or Latinx church tradition might learn and embody church music very differently than those of us who grew up singing in traditional New England churches. Then there are those of all traditions and cultures who have no church background or experience at all, for whom our musical culture is equally foreign.
- In churches everywhere, but especially in the Northeastern region of the U.S., choirs are aging and shrinking. In talking with several of my colleagues, they report that their groups were already becoming smaller before the pandemic, and now the pandemic has further decimated their singing groups for various reasons.

Well, should we just forget the whole idea, then? I say no. There is still wonderful music to be made by groups of people singing together, and the experience itself is very cathartic. The difference between a church choir and, say, a community chorus, is that in the latter, the volunteers are there for the sole purpose of singing together. One hopes that a church choir forms with individuals who are already part of a body of people who want to learn about, serve and glorify God. So, if you count yourself in that category and you want to sing with us, let me know! I'll find a way to make it work.



And now, an announcement. On January 16 I marked 15 years as the Music Director here at South, and I was already thinking about something I would like to have happen as a means of renewing myself and bringing new life into my ministry. I recently asked the Leadership Circle to approve a four-month sabbatical for me, and they did so without objection. So, beginning May 16 of this year I'll be away from you for a while, returning on the Sunday after Labor Day. I hope to divide the time between rest, learning and traveling, and I'm going to try to visit some different churches and learn how they are moving through the 21st century, particularly with music. While I'm gone, you'll have a variety of musical experts to make your worship experience meaningful, some you already know and some you don't. And before you know it, it will be September and I'll be back, ready to continue with you the spiritual path we have been following.

But don't say good-bye yet. That time is still three months away. - *Larry*
