From the Pastor

Dear South,

We are emerging. The warmer weather is arriving. Flowering trees are blooming. Green shoots are wiggling their strong way up toward the sun, called out of their protective slumbers. Or maybe they were awake all winter underground there, in the cave of beginnings, just in different forms. Along the concrete sidewalks more grass is peeping. Some neighbors have planted rows of tulip bulbs which have popped up looking like soccer teams giving



each other high fives. The forsythia is wearing her hair natural and bright; she knows how to live yes to life's emergence. It is Eastertide, the season between Easter and Pentecost.

We will soon be in a new season at South: Larry will commence his sabbatical, taking time apart from the routines of being South's Music Director, which he has done for 15 years, on May 16th. Anita Cooper, a guest musician also named Larry, and Julissa Lee Rodriguez will be our music leaders while Larry's away. A new person, yet unknown, will be joining the staff at some point soon as a part-time Communications Coordinator and Office Administrator. Kim Figueroa, Natanael Velez and Janice Hills are the Hiring Team in this process.

This week, the last week in April, a group of women have been gathering with me over Zoom for a 7:00 am Writing as Spiritual Practice group. We start with a free write then do a longer writing session on a poem-prompt. After writing, we share some of what we have found in the process. One poem was by Walter Brueggeman, called "Yes."

I share the poem here as a prompt for you in praying through the Eastertide questions. How do we **live yes to God** is the overarching question of the poem. This is also the overarching question for South in this new season.

Yes by Walter Brueggeman

You are the God who is simple, direct, clear with us and for us. You have committed yourself to us. You have said yes to us in creation, yes to us in our birth, yes to us in our baptism, yes to us in our awakening this day.

But we are of another kind, more accustomed to "perhaps, maybe, we'll see," left in wonderment and ambiguity.

We live our lives not back to your yes, but out of our endless "perhaps."

So we pray for your mercy this day that we may live yes back to you, yes with our time, yes with our money, yes with our sexuality, yes with our strength and with our weakness, yes to our neighbor, yes and no longer, "perhaps."

In the name of your enfleshed yes to us, even Jesus who is our yes into your future. Amen.



South Church, how do we need to change in order to **live yes** to life's emergence in us, through us, with us, today and into tomorrow? Pray with this poem.

Reflect on the experience of vitality of South and where the energy of life in South actually *is* today, not yesterday. Allow the feelings of where it *should be* fall away. Allow the nostalgia of how it *was* bring its bittersweetness. Allow the feelings of

fear, tightness, anxiousness in - they are there because you anticipate the change that is required. You can endure change, survive it, maybe even lead it. Even more so, like Jesus the one who comes through, we can *come through change* into resurrected life.

We are entering into a deeply spiritual season in the life of South. A season of decisions we'd rather not make, conversations we'd rather not have, uncertainties abounding we'd rather not feel. These are all already present and they will be even more so. The changes at South already in process are preparing ground; let us not waste the fertile soil in fear or procrastination but instead choose to deepen into faith in our God who turns the tomb into a womb.



Director of Music

Last Sunday I stood up and spoke a little bit about what my sabbatical will be about, and I expressed a desire to *go to church every Sunday*. Wait, you say, don't you do that already? Well, I do, but my plan is to go to a *different* church every Sunday. We church musicians live somewhat in our own worlds that unfold at about the same time every Sunday, so we rarely experience worship the way it is done in other churches.

So, in thinking about what taking a sabbatical means, it felt like it should be more than just a time of rest, but also a time to have new experiences. In this case, it feels right to continue doing what I've done every Sunday morning, only in different places. In some cases, I will be traveling and will have the opportunity to experience worship events in those places. At other times I will travel to find a church. Here are just a few of the churches I hope to visit during the next four months:

Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York City: Did you know that the largest cathedral in the world is only 115 miles from Springfield? It is also the fifth largest church in the world (the largest is St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican City). It is the seat of the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of New York. You can see a picture of it at www.stjohndivine.org. The music and worship offerings vary greatly and the worship atmosphere is extraordinary.

Old South Church, Boston: This church broke away from First Church Boston in 1669 because of dissenters who wanted the waters of baptism to be more liberally administered. Coincidentally, the third (and current) meetinghouse was completed in 1875, the same year that the Maple Street building of South Church Springfield was also finished. Excellent music is to be heard at Old South Boston and particularly attractive to me is the Jazz Worship in the chapel on Thursday evenings. www.OldSouth.org

The Church at Convergence: I hope to fit in a visit to our nation's capital, and it would be an easy trip to this innovative church in Alexandria, VA, which takes creativity and the arts to a new level. I went to their website, www.vergenow.org, and under "about us" I found a section called Values and Beliefs that is unlike any I've seen on any other church website.

Broadway United Church of Christ, New York City: This congregation is led by the Rev. Dr. Michael Piazza, who some South members have encountered in one or more workshops that he has led on church revitalization. As you can imagine, being on Broadway in New York City, this church offers music that has a broad appeal. www.broadwayucc.org

Chatauqua Institution: I'll be spending an entire week at this haven for the arts, culture, learning and religion and I will have the opportunity to go to church every morning. www.chq.org

Of course, there are many churches around the country that I can attend just by turning on my computer on Sunday morning. I hope to have the resources to travel to some of them, though, at least the ones in the northeastern region of the country.

I'll miss you all this summer, and at the same time I know the summer is going to race by and before you and I know it, September will be here and I'll be with you again, hopefully laden with new ideas about how we can make music together. Until then, remember me in your prayers!



SOUTH CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the South Church Scholarship Program is to assist members of the church with their undergraduate education, technical training or preparation for the ministry. Grant award decisions will be consistent with the application criteria and committee procedures described below.

COLLEGES/UNIVERSITIES

It is required that all colleges or universities be accredited educational institutions granting associate, bachelor, and/or advanced degrees.

TECHNICAL TRAINING

It is required all programs be certified and provide a certificate or license upon graduation.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS—UNDERGRADUATE GRANTS

- 1. You or your parents(s) are members of South Church and/or there is a pattern of active involvement in church life.
- 2. You demonstrate academic potential as evidenced by your most recent transcript.
- 3. If a freshman, you have been accepted by an accredited institution.
- 4. If second year or beyond, you are enrolled and will be attending in the fall.
- 5. You have financial need as indicated on the application form.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS—TECHNICAL TRAINING

- 1. You or your parent(s) are members of South Church and/or there is a pattern of active involvement in church life.
- 2. You are able to provide proof of acceptance with an established start date.
- 3. You have financial need as indicated on the application form.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS—MINISTERIAL GRANTS

- 1. You are a member of South Church.
- 2. There is a pattern of active involvement in church life.
- 3. You demonstrate academic potential as evidenced by your most recent transcript.
- 4. You are enrolled and will be attending in the fall.
- 5. You have financial need as indicated on the application form.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

ALL APPLICANTS: Get an application from Elaine at 567-6486 or e-mail elentino@msn.com. You can also get an application online at the South Church web site, www.sococh.org, or in the church Parish Hall. Deadline for completing the application and for returning to the committee chair is May 31. Include a copy of a recent transcript or progress report. Be available in June for a personal interview by phone or in person. Please keep this page for your records. You are responsible for all deadlines. A new application must be completed each year a grant is requested. Checks will be sent to your institution's financial office half in early September, half in January. It is important you provide an accurate address. Send all requested materials or questions to:
